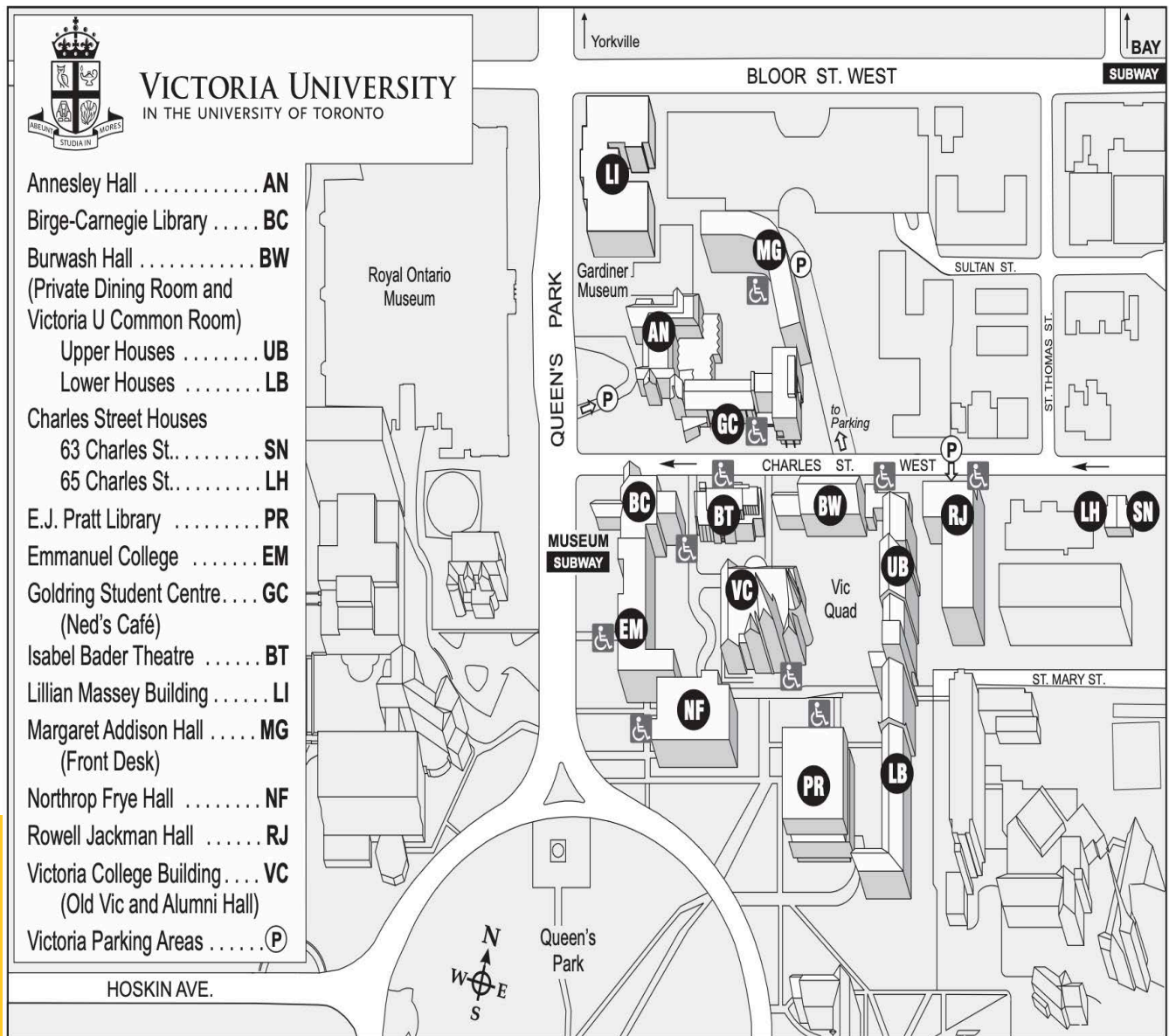

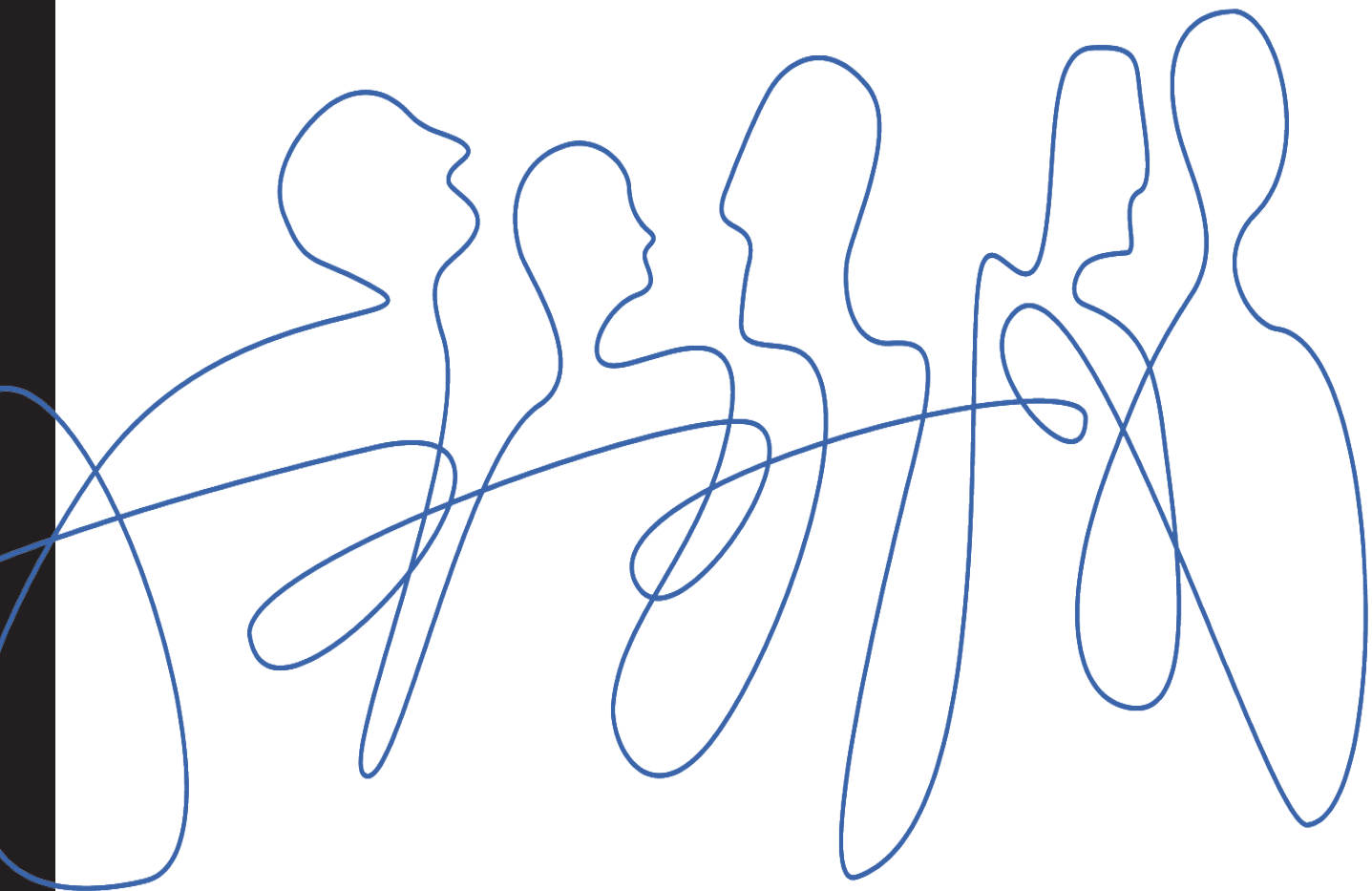

Jude Kong is an Assistant Professor at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health. His principal research program focuses on developing and deploying innovative AI, mathematical and data science methodologies and technologies for decision-makers in communities, public health, government and industry.

Kong is a Tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Community-Oriented Artificial Intelligence & Mathematical Modelling of Infectious Diseases.



Notisha Massaquoi is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Health and Society at U of T Scarborough (UTSC). Massaquoi is a community-based researcher utilizing mixed methods to interrogate anti-Black racism and highlight the experiences of Black communities navigating institutional structures and systems in Canada, with a primary focus on the social determinants of health.

She is the inaugural recipient of the Connaught Major Research Challenge for Black Researchers award.
